

Kohinoor Begum is an entrepreneur from Thakurgaon, situated in the north western side of Bangladesh. She has a little cloth store and is planning to expand it. So she came to Dhaka to present her project at the Design Lab. The Yunus Centre Social Business Design Lab is a meeting place for people of diverse backgrounds having only one goal – developing social business for the betterment of society. The Social Business Design Lab is a daylong program for the people who are interested in social business. This Design Lab is structured in a way to train, brainstorm and involve its participants in social business as well as develop new ideas. So Miss Begum was one of them.

Thakurgaon is near about 400km away from Dhaka and takes no less than 12 hours to travel.

MY SOCIAL BUSINESS PLAN

One of the social problems around the world is a phenomenon known as 'Feminization of Poverty' which explains why poverty strikes women harder than men as they get paid less even though they provide hard labor.

In developing countries, this phenomenon is easily noticeable. My social business plan includes the disadvantaged groups like divorced, widowed or elderly women who do not have any male support and are having a hard time earning because of such cultural biases. The plan is to collect funds to open a roadside restaurant which

they will run. A group of 5-6 women will be selected. The location will be nearby any college or university and the meals will be regular Bengali meals popular among students. The women do not



need training for cooking as they will already know how to cook the regular items and they would only need training for business transactions and maintaining hygiene. It's a business done by men mostly in Dhaka and it is a profitable business as well.

A group leader among the women will be selected. The profit generated from the business will be shared among the group and certain percentage of the money generated will be given as the management fee and certain percentage will be used for re-investment for further expansion. After the repayment of the initial amount in a span of two years, the entrepreneurs will gain the sole ownership of the program. This will not only give them a place in the male-dominating business but also will develop leadership skills so that they do not have to depend on anyone in future.


